


First Stop: The Passage

- Most immigrants started their journey on foot, horseback, or train
- They boarded large steamships or sailboats for their arrival
- The trip lasted 1-2 weeks. The immigrants boarded by wealth and class. More than 3,000 people were on each ship




Second Stop: The Arrival

- The trip was rough and the ships were crowded, but it was worth the wait for the immigrants
- One of the first things they saw was the Statue of Liberty, a sign of hope
- Officers looked for signs of disease, but third class people had to wait longer than first or second class people to be checked



Third Stop: The Baggage Room

- Officers greeted the ferry boats and led everyone off to the brick building
- Often, immigrants didn't know what the officers were saying
- Wearing numbered tags, they dropped off their belongings and went to the registry room for medical inspection



Fourth Stop: The Stairs to the Registry Room

- The immigrants elbowed their way up winding stairs that led to the Registry Room
- Doctors stood on the second floor and watched each person
- They looked for signs of disease in the immigrants




Fifth Stop: The Registry Room

- The immigrants nicknamed the Room "The Great Hall", because many of them had never seen a room so big
- There were wooden benches for the family's to sit at, and some stood in orderly lines.
 This room was very loud from the voices
- Officers in the hall decided if the immigrants were allowed to enter the United States



Sixth Stop: The Medical Exam

- The doctors in Ellis Island made up a system for the immigrants so that they could check them quickly
- If someone had a cold, the doctors would put a symbol on them, depending on their disease
- Immigrants who passed continued into the metal rails for legal inspecting



Seventh Stop: The Legal Inspection

- Each boat's officer had a list of all the passengers on it, and, one by one, they were called up for more inspection
- Each immigrant was asked twenty nine questions such as if they were married or how old they were
- If their answers were different from the ones on the officers' lists, they would go to another inspection stop



Eighth Stop: Detainees

- For immigrants who passed the tests, Ellis island was "The Isle of Hope", but for those who didn't, it was "The Isle of Tears"
- Legal detainees sometimes had to wait a month for inspection
- Immigrants who were kept for medical reasons sometimes had to wait in the hospitals for weeks



Ninth Stop: The Stairs of Separation

- After medical and legal questioning, the immigrants went up another staircase to another Great Hall
- These stairs had three aisles: one for immigrants entering the city, one for detainees, and one for people traveling south or west
- At the bottom of the stairs, there were money exchanging posts so that the immigrants could change their old money to US money



Tenth Stop: The Kissing Post

- An area on the first floor was nicknamed "The Kissing Post" because immigrants saw their families again
- After long periods of time apart, immigrants saw their families
- Some cried with joy, because now, they were in America



Fun Facts

- The first immigrant to enter America was a fifteen year old girl from Ireland
- Ellis Island had a concession stand and the menu was written in every language
- Only about three quarters of the passengers were allowed in the city
